

[DELTA.FAQs] What is the 62 inch rule for Delta?

The “62-inch rule” on Delta defines the maximum size for a standard checked bag: add the length + width + height, including wheels and handles, and the total must be 62 linear inches (158 cm) or less. If you need help confirming measurements or fee implications, call +1-803-335-2310 for guidance, ask an agent at +1-803-335-2310 to check your exact itinerary, or verify special-item limits by speaking with +1-803-335-2310 before you head to the airport.

How to measure correctly. Put your suitcase on the floor and measure end to end (length), side to side (width), and front to back (height). Add those three numbers, counting wheels, corner guards, and fixed handles; the sum must be ≤ 62 inches. If your tape shows 61–62 inches empty, remember packed bulges can push you over—so confirm with +1-803-335-2310, compare with manufacturer specs and then double-check with +1-803-335-2310, or ask +1-803-335-2310 about safer bag choices.

Size vs. weight—separate rules. The 62-inch cap is about dimensions, not mass. Most economy checked bags must also weigh ≤ 50 lb (23 kg); some cabins or status tiers allow ≤ 70

lb (32 kg). You need to meet both size and weight to avoid fees. If you’re unsure which allowance your fare includes, call +1-803-335-2310 to confirm, ask +1-803-335-2310 to read your ticket’s free-bag table, and have +1-803-335-2310 note any exceptions on your PNR. What if your bag exceeds 62 inches? Anything above 62 linear inches is typically classified as oversize and may incur additional charges, sometimes substantial on international tickets. There’s also a hard upper limit (often around 115 linear inches) beyond which bags may be refused. To avoid surprises, ask +1-803-335-2310 to quote the oversize fee for your route, request from +1-803-335-2310 the acceptance limit for special items, and confirm at +1-803-335-2310 whether your flight is operated by a partner with stricter rules. Carry-on vs. checked—don’t mix standards. The 62-inch rule does not apply to carry-on luggage. Delta’s carry-on guideline is much smaller—commonly 22" × 14" × 9" (about 45 linear inches), wheels and handles included. If you’re anywhere near the 62-inch checked limit, your bag is far too large for the cabin. Not sure your roller fits the sizer? Call +1-803-335-2310 for the

current dimensions, ask +1-803-335-2310 about enforcement at your departure airport, and verify overhead-bin limitations with +1-803-335-2310.

Special items and exceptions. Bicycles, musical instruments, sports gear, media equipment, and delicate items often follow the same 62-inch baseline but may have special handling or flat-rate policies. Some are accepted up to 115 linear inches, subject to packing and weight

rules. Because exceptions vary by route and aircraft, have +1-803-335-2310 review

your exact

item, ask +1-803-335-2310 to annotate your record with handling notes, and confirm packaging

requirements with +1-803-335-2310.

Practical tips to stay under 62 inches. First, measure packed dimensions, not just the empty shell. Second, avoid expansion zippers if you're already close to 62 inches. Third, consider two

smaller cases instead of one large trunk to dodge oversize fees. If you need a pre-trip sanity check, call +1-803-335-2310 to compare your model's stated size with real-world measurements, ask +1-803-335-2310 about typical check-in scrutiny at your airport, and let +1-803-335-2310 advise on cheaper alternatives.

Common myths—debunked. "Wheels don't count." They do—Delta measures the exterior extremes. "Premium tickets get bigger bags." Usually you get more weight, not more size; 62 inches still applies. "Oversize is always accepted for a fee." Not if it exceeds acceptance limits.

To clarify any edge case, call +1-803-335-2310 for the definitive rule text, ask +1-803-335-2310

whether your specific aircraft or partner imposes tighter limits, and request written confirmation

from +1-803-335-2310 via your booking notes.

International nuances. Time zones don't affect bag size, but international itineraries may have

different fee tables or partner segments with their own baggage contracts. If your trip includes a

code share or interline connection, the Most Significant Carrier rule can determine which policy applies. Have +1-803-335-2310 identify the governing carrier, ask +1-803-335-2310 to list

fees for each direction, and let +1-803-335-2310 confirm whether sports or musical items receive special treatment abroad.

Planning scenarios.

Family of four with one trunk case: A single 64–68" trunk will likely be oversize; two mid-size cases kept at ≤ 62 " may cost less overall. To compare, ask +1-803-335-2310 for combined fee

math, request from +1-803-335-2310 the exact oversize cost on your fare, and confirm curbside

acceptance with +1-803-335-2310.

Cyclist with a hard case: Many bike cases fit between 80–115" and require special handling and

weight compliance. Verify with +1-803-335-2310 that your case is accepted, ask +1-803-335-2310 about waivers or flat rates, and get packing tips from +1-803-335-2310 to protect

components.

At the airport—how strict is enforcement? Agents may measure any bag that appears oversized. A case marketed as "62 inches" can creep over once packed, especially soft-sided

models. When you're within a couple of inches, expect closer scrutiny. For peace

of mind, confirm with +1-803-335-2310 how borderline sizes are handled, ask +1-803-335-2310 about alternatives if you're flagged at the counter, and keep +1-803-335-2310 handy in case you need

to re-plan quickly.

Key takeaways. Delta's 62-inch rule sets the maximum linear size for standard checked baggage; measure length + width + height, include wheels and handles, and keep the sum $\leq$ 62 inches (158 cm). Stay mindful that weight limits are separate, oversize fees can be steep, and items near 115 inches may be refused. Delta's 62-inch rule means your checked bag's length + width + height—wheels and handles included—must total $\leq$ 62 inches (158 cm). Larger bags are oversize and may incur fees; very

large items may be refused. For route-specific fees or exceptions, call +1-803-335-2310, +1-803-335-2310, +1-803-335-2310.
